Education Funding

The theme of Education Funding included recommendations based on data collected through the Re-Imagine initiative about resources, decision making around resources and the provision of resources.

These recommendations are:

- **10.** Conduct a comprehensive study to determine the real costs of a quality education system fit for the 21st century and commit to long-term funding mechanisms to ensure students receive quality education.
- Any funding model must be designed to provide the resources to support the varied needs of students, including behavioral issues, learning needs, cultural diversity and mental health.

What We Found



79%

of respondents
agreed or strongly
agreed that funding
for education
is everyone's
responsibility.



72%

of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that it is important to have meaningful voice in how schools are paid for (kinds of taxes, level of tax, who/what is taxed), but only 26 percent felt it is likely or very likely to occur.



53%

of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that they would be willing to pay higher taxes if they knew the money would go to PreK-12 education.

What We Heard

"The K-12 school system is underfunded to the point where they are not able to offer the quality education students deserve. A good example of this would be large classroom sizes."

"A fully funded education system. More resources for the frontline teachers.

Access to specialized classrooms with proper support. Inclusion does NOT work without support!"

What can you do?

Hold provincial government accountable through letters, phone calls and conversations with your MLA to ensure they support predictable, stable and appropriate levels of funding to ensure a robust and successful public education system.
